Chain Reaction Foundation Ltd is incorporated and domiciled in New South Wales, Australia. The registered office is at 7/112 Ben Boyd Road, Neutral Bay, NSW, 2089.

The principal activities of the company during the financial period were to work for the alleviation of poverty in local communities, to identify and support social cohesion and local citizen engagement in building social capital, and to create strong links between community, government and business leaders in supporting those people who are in human and financial need and or marginalised by practises of exclusion.

The entity operates through the services of its Chief Executive Officer, Administrator, Project Manager and a team of pro bono Specialist Consultants (34), Partnership Organisations (37) and local volunteers (12).

Operating Results

The net surplus for the financial year ending June 30 2013 was \$12,569 (2012 – surplus \$7,372). There is no liability for income tax because the company is exempt from income tax.

Mt Druitt Learning Ground Project

Chain Reaction's major work for 2012 – 13 has been the further development of Mt Druitt Learning Ground. The project is designed as a behavioural change management centre offered to the most culturally diverse and disadvantaged families in the eleven suburbs of Mt Druitt, a population of 60,000. It is designed as a "safe haven" in which families can acquire self-confidence and personal living and literacy and numeracy skills such that they will be enabled to participate in mainstream living thus entering or re-entering school or other institutions of learning and or working in the community in voluntary or paid work. Chain Reaction staff together with volunteers prepared curriculum and course material and took care of recruitment details. Learning Ground continued to

operate throughout 2012 – 13. A Part-time Project Coordinator was re-appointed in March for 12 months when FaHCSIA funding was acquired with the assistance of Hon. Ed Husic Member for Chifley.

At the time of reporting Learning Ground is serving more than 60 families at a time consisting of at least one child and one adult from each family and has a waiting list. Twenty seven school terms have been completed resulting in most of the children and young people participants returning to school on a four day a week basis, attending Learning Ground in an on-going manner one day per week. Adult family members have continued on a weekly basis and many families have achieved full time or part time paid work, others have gained volunteer positions all of which entail on-going community development training, over 200 school refuses or young people experiencing school suspensions have returned to school without further offences.

Learning Ground is unique in that it offers a community education program in behavioural change for adults, youth and children alike, pays particular attention to traditional and contemporary Aboriginal thinking and embraces cultural faith and ethnic diversity and learning through the celebration of difference.

Progression from pilot to sustainable program is now <u>the challenge</u> and every effort is being made to establish on-going funding and to write the program in detail which will prepare it for replication in other communities across the country as desirable.

We are particularly appreciative of funding received from DEEWR, FaHCSIA and private donor John Reid which has made the programme possible this year.

Parenting Programme – Family Life

We were able to continue the Parent or "Family Life Program for a third year. Working together with our Partner Organisation, The Parent Practice Australia, we have tailored the work to be particularly helpful to Aboriginal families. The programme was offered three times in this reporting period. Two groups of twelve parents in each attended training mornings each week for six weeks. Training was conducted in how to:

- Catch children doing what is right and to build on the positive
- Listening with the capacity to really hear what is being said
- Assisting in the dynamic process of setting families up for success in living together
- Establishing rules that matter
- Taking corrective steps that really work.

We are most appreciative of the funding made available by DEEWR and FaHCSIA to conduct the programme at Learning Ground this year.

Enablers Programme and Development of Train-the-Trainer Manual

We have continued to offer the Enablers Leadership Programme to community leaders from Western Sydney. Completing our eighth year of offering the programme to around 300 participants.

We have also conducted a Train-the-Trainer programme for 12 volunteer local mentors from Mt Druitt.

Chain Reaction Breakfast Café

KPMG NSW and VIC, Senior Partner, Paul Reid, has hosted the bi-monthly Breakfast Café program in Melbourne and Sydney.

Around 80 people – business, government and community leaders are regular breakfast attendees. The concept and practise of social cohesion from different perspectives is examined at each breakfast with a range of excellent speakers drawn from Chain Reaction Specialist Consultants and other eminent citizens.

Attendees are invited to come to breakfast on the understanding that they in turn will host a breakfast inviting others to do the same, thus creating a 'chain reaction' of breakfasts convened around the selected topics.

Summary

The Foundation's eleventh year of operation has been challenging with high demands for service and with exceedingly limited resources to be able to meet the demand. Outreach to private Trusts and Foundations are now very limited in yielding a positive result.

Consultations, Workshops and Forums have clearly filled a community need, and through this means a satisfactory outreach to decision makers in business, government and community has taken place.

The Breakfast Café in Melbourne and Sydney has taken an even stronger place in Australia this year as a valuable forum for examination of social issues.

The decision to "stay with" the local community of Mt Druitt, 2770 postcode has been rewarding. Indigenous and non-indigenous leaders from the area have contributed substantially to both the Enablers Project as well as to the development of Learning Ground. Chain Reaction's goal of making a valuable contribution to the capacity building of community leaders and their organisations is being realised.

Learning Ground is offering strong community leadership in behavioural change management and the Family Life Programme has been an excellent development for families of the area.

Chain Reaction continues to strive to encourage Australia's citizens to volunteer to become engaged in the communities of which they are a part. Exclusion is increasingly difficult to break as we witness a number of divides operating strenuously in community be they socio-economic, religious, ethnic, age, gender or city/rural and the like. Family violence and substance abuses are ever present in local communities.

We are pleased to be making a significant contribution to the development of the government's strategic plan for volunteering over the next decade as a way forward in breaking the exclusion cycle and are most proactive to enhancing our partnership with Volunteering Australia in the area of volunteering and citizen engagement in preparation for the 23rd International Association for Volunteer Effort World Volunteer Conference.

Chain Reaction President Margaret Bell is Chair of the Conference Organising Committee and Chain Reaction Director Dorothy Harding is the Conference Project Manager. 2,000 delegates from over 70 countries are expected to attend the Conference on the Gold Coast in Queensland in September 2014.

We find ourselves on a challenging road to travel to identify funding for our valuable work it has certainly been a road less travelled but one of immense rewards to those who have made the journey. To all those who have believed in us we are particularly grateful.

Chain Reaction strives to encourage living in harmony which requires interaction rather than living in isolation brought about by the excessive pursuit of individualism leading to fear and withdrawal from community. Social cohesion is paramount to building healthy communities it is both our task and our dream. We have come to see that volunteering for change is more necessary than it has ever been and we continue to strive toward that end as we view volunteer effort as TODAY'S IMPERATIVE.

1. Statement of significant accounting policies

Basis of Preparation and statement of compliance

In the opinion of the Directors, the company is not a reporting entity as defined in Statement of Accounting Concepts 1: "Definition of the Reporting Entity". The financial statements of company have been drawn up as a special purpose financial report for use by the Directors and members and to fulfil the Directors' duties under the Corporations Act 2001 to prepare financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared on the accruals basis of accounting using the historical cost convention and a going concern assumption. Except where stated, they do not take into account changing money values. Except where noted, the accounting policies have been consistently applied.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all Australian Accounting Standards (including the Australian Accounting Interpretations) and other mandatory financial reporting requirements in Australia with the following exceptions where some or all of the disclosure provisions have not been followed:

The company recognises donations when received and grant income as revenue when funds have been committed by the project sponsor in respect of expenditure incurred.

Expenses

Expenses are brought to account on an accruals basis.

Income Tax

The company has been endorsed as an exempt charitable body for income tax purposes under the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Independent audit report to the members of Chain Reaction Foundation Limited

Report on the financial report

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Chain Reaction Foundation Ltd (the company), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2013, statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year ended on that date, notes 1 to 3 comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information and the directors' declaration.

Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Report

The directors of the company are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial statements, is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001 and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The directors' responsibility also includes such internal control as the directors determine necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards.
