Principal Activity

Chain Reaction Foundation Ltd is incorporated and domiciled in New South Wales, Australia. The registered office is at 7/112 Ben Boyd Road, Neutral Bay, NSW, 2089.

The principal activities of the company during the financial period were to work for the alleviation of poverty in local communities, to identify and support social cohesion and local citizen engagement in building social capital, and to create strong links between community, government and business leaders in supporting those people who are in human and financial need and or marginalised by practises of exclusion.

The entity operates through the services of its Chief Executive Officer, Administrator, Project Manager and a team of pro bono Specialist Consultants (31), Partnership Organisations (41) and local volunteers (18).

Operating Results

The net surplus for the financial year ending June 30 2016 was 46,622 (2015 – 4,570). There is no liability for income tax because the company is exempt from income tax.

Mt Druitt Learning Ground Project

Learning Ground has continued to offer its programs throughout the 2770 postcode. All programs are focused on behavioural change management and offered to the most culturally diverse and disadvantaged families in the eleven suburbs of Mt Druitt, a population of over 80,000 people. Particular outreach takes place to families of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander background and also of culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

The past year has seen up to 100 families taking advantage of the programs at any one time:Mondays:Older Adolescent Group12 – 17 years 9.30am – 2.30pmTuesdays:Family Skills for parents, grandparents, carers of young peopleWednesdays:Younger Adolescents10 – 12 years 10.00am – 2.00pmThursdays:Enablers Program for volunteers wishing to work in any aspect of building socialcohesion in local communities in families, schools, NGO's or churchesFridays:Youth Activity Program – team building recreational program5.30pm – 8.30pm

To date this year over 40 young people have been returned to schools throughout the area without further truancy and or suspension records occurring, and 80 adults have participated in Family Skills and Enablers Programs.

Research and Evaluation – Western Sydney University

We received a grant from Ian Potter Foundation to conduct a full research and evaluation of all Learning Ground programs. The work was conducted by Dr Roberto Parada, Dr Brenda Dobia, and Kon Kalos from the School of Education, Western Sydney University. Dr Parada is a senior lecturer in adolescent development and wellbeing, Behaviour and Pedagogical Studies, and Dr Dobia also a senior lecturer in the School of Education. Dr Dobia led resources development for "Kids Matter" the national primary schools mental health initiative, she is currently working with

NAPCAN (National Association for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect) and the NSW Aboriginal Educational Consultative Group. Kon Kalos has 30 years teaching experience across primary, secondary and tertiary sectors, until recently he has been a Principal with the Cape York Academy.

The work undertaken on behalf of Learning Ground was a study over six months and involved a quantitative and qualitative study. Surveys were conducted on-line and over the telephone.

Focus groups were conducted with Adolescent Groups, Past Participants, those engaged in Family Skills and Enablers Programs and Mentors.

A thorough examination of all program material including the programs stories and narratives was conducted.

Findings found the programs to be:

- AN EXCELLENT COMMUNITY EDUCATION MODEL consistent with its stated philosophy of "each one teach one" a series of programs embedded in the community by the community.
- HIGH QUALITY OF SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LITERACY
- EXCELLENT METACOGNITIVE SKILLS teaching thinking about thinking
- COGNITIVE AND AFFECTIVE REFLEXIVITY
- HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL SKILLS FOR SELF-AWARENESS AND SELF-ESTEEM BUILDING
- EXCELLENT EXAMPLE OF WRAP AROUND SERVICES CURRENTLY BEING EXPLORED IN MODERN EDUCATIONAL METHODS

The programs focus groups revealed participants believing they had achieved:

- Immeasurable lifelong learning skills
- Discovered a sense of purpose
- Accepted new knowledge regarding their personal strengths and challenges
- Acquired a sense of belonging
- .Completed the program believing they had something to gain and something to give
- A certain readiness to continue formal education or to enter the workforce

Interviews with facilitators and mentors revealed:

- Great respect for Learning Ground participants
- Patience
- Compassion
- High levels of competence in delivering descriptive praise and emotion coaching
- Efficient knowledge of strengths and challenges faced by each participant

Recommendations:

- More strategic promotion of Learning Ground Programs in Schools and wider community
- Further development of teacher contact with Learning Ground
- Offering Enablers and Family Skills Programs to teachers in schools
- Focus on teacher development in offering descriptive praise and emotion coaching
- Seeking stronger relationship with Department of Education especially through "Positive Behaviour for Learning" a work in progress in Department.
- Working with Western Sydney University to build up Aboriginal specific content in the programs.

Mt Druitt Learning Ground Information and Fund Raising Event – October 2015

An Information and Fund Raising Dinner was conducted at West Tradies at Darug. Attended by around 150 supporters of Learning Ground. A happy mix of music, and fun as well as information about Learning Ground itself. Young Alumnae addressed the gathering and were received very

well. Awards were made to Chifley College Shalvey Campus and Tregear Primary School for their strong support of students participating at Learning Ground.

\$4,000 was raised from the event and the net proceeds of nearly \$3,000 purchased some necessary air conditioning for Learning Ground as well as an improved security system. Plans are already underway for a similar event in 2016.

Chain Reaction Breakfast Café

The Breakfast Cafe continues to be supported by Price Waterhouse Coopers (PwC) in Sydney and Melbourne. The breakfasts are well attended around 40 people to each one. Guest speakers have remained of high quality. Each speaker addresses the topic of social cohesion and how that relates to their particular area of interest.

Summary

The first half of the reporting year was fraught with anxiety that funding for our projects would not be available in an on-going manner, applications were made everywhere possible. We are now, thanks to the Neilson Family Foundation, in a much stronger position.

The Foundation has guaranteed funding for three years and during this period has the expectation of Chain Reaction being able to raise its profile and consequently to be able to attract more permanent funding from government and other sources too.

A Chain Reaction promotion plan is currently being undertaken making comprehensive use of social media for this purpose.

Mt Druitt Learning Ground is fully operational. Program participants are presenting increasing challenges and requiring strongly personalised case studies. A full time Project Manager and a Teacher specialising in literacy and numeracy have been essential additions to the progress of the work.

Friday evening recreational program is proving an important addition to the safety of family life for young people in the 2770 postcode. A part-time male Youth Worker has been an important addition to the staff.

The findings of the evaluation conducted by Western Sydney University is invaluable to the recognition of the academic value of the Learning Ground Program and it is anticipated will be a great asset to the future pursuit of funding to carry the work forward.

Special thanks to the Chain Reaction Board of Directors for the on-going support for all of our work.

1. Statement of significant accounting policies

Basis of Preparation and statement of compliance

Report on the financial report

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Chain Reaction Foundation Ltd (the company), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2016, statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year ended on that date, notes 1 to 3 comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information and the directors' declaration.

Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Report

The directors of the company are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial statements, is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. These Auditing Standards require that I comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report.
