### **Company Secretary**

The company secretary is Rumbi Mabambe, Executive Officer, Chain Reaction Foundation.

### **Principal Activity**

Chain Reaction Foundation Ltd is incorporated and domiciled in New South Wales, Australia. The registered office is at 7/112 Ben Boyd Road, Neutral Bay, NSW, 2089.

The principal activities of the company during the financial period were to work for the alleviation of poverty in local communities, to identify and support social cohesion and local citizen engagement in building social capital, and to create strong links between community, government and business leaders in supporting those people who are in human and financial need and/or marginalised by practises of exclusion.

The entity operates through the services of its Chief Executive Officer, Executive Officer/Administrator, Small Learning Ground Team (8 Parttime) Pro Bono Specialist Consultants and Volunteers (20), organisations working in partnerships and consultations (19) and local volunteers (12).

### **Operating Results**

The net result for the financial year ended June 30, 2023 was a loss of \$366,718 (2022– \$207,606 profit). There is no liability for income tax because the company is exempt from income tax.

The reporting period to August 2023 has been a challenging one for Chain Reaction Foundation. We have completed six programs throughout the financial year and have been glad to be able to remain fully operational post COVID together with funding concerns has led to stressful consequences affecting the levels of wellbeing for students, families, teachers and Chain Reaction staff.

# Participants Attending Learning Ground Centre:

Participants attend Learning Ground in two groups. Monday ages 13 – 17, and Wednesday aged 11 – 13.

Older participants have demonstrated having particular challenges in being able to continue day to day school attendance and being able to show the ability to meet the required learning needed to do that. Habits have been formed making excessive use of digital devices, a habit hard to break leading to excessive gaming and use of endless social media. Families often do not discourage the practise because being on the devices keeps the young people at home and in their rooms causing less angst for families being worried about external behaviour. Education encouraging the will to 'make effort' needs increasing concentration at Learning Ground. Student motivation is lower than previously experienced in this age group. Hand in hand with poor motivation we are seeing a much higher rate of low self-esteem. Much encouragement is needed in both of these areas requiring working one on one with students and taking longer unhurried meetings than have perhaps been needed in the past.

Younger (Wednesday) participants are showing an increasing capacity to 'bounce back' and to being able to assume every day school life. Like their fellow students they are struggling to develop the level of maturity needed to be in High School but if currently attending schools demonstrating interest in supporting student well-being progress is able to be more rapid at Learning Ground in achieving positive mental health and other developmental outcomes.

## Learning Ground in School (LGiS):

LGiS has concluded its 3-year pilot project in partnership with Western Sydney University which has undertaken a 3-year research and evaluation of the program in 4 of the 6 schools engaged in the program. The findings have been reported by WSU at a launch conducted at Chifley College Dunheved 25 August. Findings of the report have been positive demonstrating the efficacy of the work. Student responses and behavioural outcomes have been most pleasing. Teachers have struggled with program delivery and have been greatly assisted by Learning Ground staff.

On-line and telephone assistance has also been available to all staff engaged in working with students participating in LGiS. Teacher struggle has been primarily due to COVID aftermath, chronic teacher shortages and uncertainty of time-tabling. The report has made recommendations to address teacher support and also to strongly articulate the learning of First Nations thinking and connectivity in the delivery of student well being aspects of the program.

The WSU research and evaluation report is available in full on Chain Reaction Foundation website. It has also been distributed to funders and prospective funders and relevant government departments both State and Federal.

Three Professional Learning Seminars for teachers and Learning Support Officers embarking on delivering LGiS have been conducted during the reporting period. Learning Ground has received NSW Education Standards Authority Accreditation (NESA) which allows teachers to participate in the Professional Learning Seminars with accreditation for their learning. Learning Ground is also accepted as a member of the Department of Education's Panel of Student Well-Being.

## Youth Activity Program (YAP):

YAP was conducted on Friday afternoons/evenings for young people 12 – 16 years during Terms 1 and 2. Designed as a fun and learning program it introduced group recreational activity demonstrating the value of working or having fun together as a team. A meal was provided at Learning Ground and Learning Ground methodology of descriptive praise and emotion coaching was applied throughout the conduct of the program. Term 1 offered Dodgeball with Zany Sports, and Term 2 conducted film making with Maya Newell.

Unfortunately due to a funding crises across all activities we were reluctantly forced in to staff redundancies which necessitated discontinuing YAP for terms 3 and 4.

## Family Skills:

We have offered Webinars, Workshops, and Six Week one day per week programs throughout the year. Attended by parents of Learning Ground participants, professionals drawn from government departments and NGO's and referred from schools and particularly Department of Communities and Justice. Families benefit from encouragement of the use of new parenting skills and recognition of the value of talking through issues they are handling at home.

Overall around 300 people a week are engaged in attending Learning Ground programs of between one and four hour durations. Countless others are participating in webinars and on-line workshops.

## Fund Development

Chain Reaction Foundation has been particularly appreciative of the on-going support of the Neilson Foundation which has enabled us to continue the activities of the Foundation.

A funding crisis was averted due to the generosity in particular of Kerr Neilson who had the Neilson Foundation cover a shortfall of \$200,000 due to an anticipated government funding allocation not occurring as scheduled.

The current year of operation has been an exceptionally difficult time in which to achieve fund development. Appeals have been made to every possible government funding sources both State and Commonwealth and also to all philanthropic organisations covering any aspect of the work of Chain Reaction.

During the financial reporting period we received grants from the following sources:

- Commonwealth Department of Social Services
- St George Foundation
- NSW Department of Communities and Justice (in-kind premises)
- Australian Philanthropic Services (APS)
- Small private donations.

### **Social Media Platform**

A continuous program was conducted throughout the year using Chain Reaction Foundation website, Learning Ground website, Twitter, Facebook, Instagram and YouTube. On-line Youth Program was also implemented during COVID 19 shut-down period. Material was provided to all schools enrolled at Learning Ground for inclusion in regular schools' newsletters and websites. A review and update of the Chain Reaction website has been completed.

## Summary

Chain Reaction has been privileged to receive on-going funding from The Neilson Foundation without whom our work would not have been possible. The support of the Foundation has been remarkable. Not only financially generous, but engagement with the trustees has shown their wonderful insight and interest in the detail of our work. Encouragement received is such that it sustains us in many ways to continue to give of our best to a standard of excellence in all services. The support at many levels has made it a challenge as well as such a pleasure to be able to offer the continuing working program during the severe consequences of the lock-down and its aftermath and has enabled us to continue working with teenagers and their families to cope with the now and prepare for the future.

# NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR CHAIN REACTION

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to have served Chain Reaction Foundation as its Executive Director since its foundation in 2002. It was with every confidence we were able to announce the appointment of **RUMBI MABAMBE** as our new Executive Director on 25 August 2023 at the launch of the WSU research report. The announcement was made in the presence of the guests of honour, Hon. Ed Husic Minister for Science and Technology, and Kerr Neilson and his daughter Paris Neilson our principal benefactors, the Directors of the Board of Directors of Chain Reaction, and over 60 guests drawn from government, philanthropic, business, education and community sectors.

Rumbi comes to us with a wealth of experience in both the business and community sectors. She holds an undergraduate degree in Economics, a Masters degree in Communication and Marketing, and is completing her PhD in Social Cohesion this year. Rumbi has been our Executive Officer at Chain Reaction since 2018. She knows and understands the value and the measure of our work thoroughly and is fully competent to handle the added responsibilities of the role of Executive Director.

My responsibilities will focus for the foreseeable future on fund development for Chain Reaction and writing and delivering the Learning Ground programs especially as recommended by the WSU report and will also focus on the Professional Learning Programs we are developing. I will continue my responsibilities as Board Chairperson for the near future.

Special thanks to the readers of our Annual Reports over the years since our beginning. We offer Rumbi a warm welcome and look forward to her leadership, and the thoughts, understanding and expertise of our new Executive Director now in place from the period commencing September 2023. We can expect a bright and very productive future for Chain Reaction and its Learning Ground work in the years ahead.

Thanks also to our honorary auditors Mawby, Cowper, Meares & Co, Paul Reid chairperson of our Finance Committee and John Hood board member, whose valuable work we could not do without.

# 1. Statement of significant accounting policies

# Basis of Preparation and statement of compliance

In the opinion of the Directors, the company is not a reporting entity as defined in Statement of Accounting Concepts 1: "Definition of the Reporting Entity". The financial statements of company have been drawn up as a special purpose financial report for use by the Directors and members and to fulfil the Directors' duties under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 to prepare financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared on the accruals basis of accounting using the historical cost convention and a going concern assumption. Except where stated, they do not take into account changing money values. Except where noted, the accounting policies have been consistently applied.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all Australian Accounting Standards (including the Australian Accounting Interpretations) and other mandatory financial reporting requirements in Australia with the following exceptions where some or all of the disclosure provisions have not been followed:

## Revenue recognition

The company recognises donations when received and grant income as revenue when funds have been committed by the project sponsor in respect of expenditure incurred.

### Expenses

Expenses are brought to account on an accruals basis.

### Income Tax

The company has been endorsed as an exempt charitable body for income tax purposes under the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

## 2. Liability of members

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## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF CHAIN REACTION FOUNDATION LIMITED

### **Report on the financial report**

I have audited the financial report (being a special purpose financial report) of Chain Reaction Foundation Limited (the Company) which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2023, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in trust capital and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information and the directors' declaration.

## Basis for qualified auditor's opinion

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the Company to fully establish internal controls over the collection of income from various revenue raising activities prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to me regarding revenue from this source was limited, my audit procedures with respect to these revenue streams had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records and information provided by the Company's management. I therefore an unable to express an option whether the unsolicited revenue obtained is complete.

### Qualified Audit opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects on the financial report of such adjustments, if any, as might have been required had the limitation on my audit procedures referred to in the qualification paragraph not existed.

- (a) the financial report of the Company presents fairly in all material respects, the Company's financial position as at 30 June 2023 and its performance for the year then ended in accordance with Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* and the accounting policies described in Note 1(b) to the accounts.
- (b) The accounting and other associated records have been properly kept during the course of the year in accordance with the *Charitable Fundraising Act (NSW) 1991 and the NSW Charitable Fundraising Regulation 2015.*
- (c) Money received as a result of fundraising appeals conducted during the year has been properly accounted for and applied in accordance with the *Charitable Fundraising Act* (NSW) 1991 and NSW Charitable Fundraising Regulation 2015.

### **Basis for opinion**

I conducted my audit in accordance with *Australian Auditing Standards*. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Report* section of our report.

The Financial Report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Company's financial reporting responsibilities under *Australian Accounting Standards, the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and Regulations*. As a result, the Financial Report and this Auditor's Report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

My report is intended solely for the Board of Chain Reaction Foundation Limited and should not be used by parties other that the Board. I disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report, or on the Financial Report to which it relates, to any person other that the Board for Chain Reaction Foundation Limited or for any other purpose than that for which it was prepared.

## Board's responsibility for the financial report
